Reasons for an adult to enter into children's play include:

- Safety
- Guidance
- Motivating
- Challenging
- Giving Knowledge
- Emotional Support
- Behaviour Guidance
- To present questions
- To guery what is taking place
- To extend the play

Knowing when to enter & exit children's play is critical to meaningful play experiences. Consider what type of playmate you are and how this impacts on children's play.

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What type of Playmate are you?

Director

Traits of Director Parent are:

- Organiser of play
- · Director of the child
- Lead the child and the activity
- Show the child how and what to do
- Stay's close by to monitor the child's progress

Facilitator

Traits of Facilitator Parent are:

- Centres their attention more on the child than on the play
- Encourages the child to choose an activity and play independently while the adult stands back without getting involved
- An encouraging, supportive and resourceful adult who attends to requests from the child for assistance.

Observer

Traits of Observer Parent are:

- Adult gives the child the freedom to play alone with little or no interaction
- Adult allows time and space for the child to play independently
- Children create their own play opportunities and socialise freely with other children & adults

Partner

Traits of Partner Parent are:

- Adult plays with the child as an equal
- Adult and the child take turns initiating and choosing the direction of play
- Adult and child negotiate about ideas and leadership
- Adult becomes a playmate in the real sense, by actively joining in the play

Ultimately, parents and professionals need to aim for a balanced mix of styles when playing with their children. Each style has its advantages, but only for short periods of time. Adults need to avoid extremes of each style.
