Playgroup SA created a digital officer position to focus solely on developing our presence in this space. Along with a dedicated position, we also engaged Haley Tamblyn PR, who specialises in social media. Through this engagement, a social media plan was developed and immediately implemented. This plan included actions such as closing our Twitter account, establishing an account on the Instagram platform and focussing our posts on social media platforms to draw families to our services. Riverland Outdoor Playgroup

Over a hundred local families turned out to see the Berri oval turned into a messy and creative wonderland, where children and their families were free to engage with mess and various mediums such as slime and gloop. A large box construction zone was set up, where creativity ruled the day, and there was plenty of space to kick, throw and catch balls and enjoy outdoor equipment. The day finished with a cold drink and sausage sizzle. Thank you to the community for supporting our event.

Presentation

Melanie Baker, Playgroup Support and Development Officer and Carley Jones, Executive Officer were fortunate to have a poster submission accepted by the 2016 Early Childhood Australia Conference held in Darwin. Playgroup SA's poster presentation was titled Engaging, Accepting, Developing; enriching the lives of families sharing a multicultural journey through Playgroup. Melanie and I highlighted the ability of Playgroup to bring together a community and develop and foster connections between families. We demonstrated how those connections can lead to community development and inclusiveness, and grow capacity and participation in the local community. Our presentation focused on how we achieved this for a community with a diverse mix of cultural differences.

Constitutional review

Playgroup SA undertook a review of the Organisation's Constitution to reflect our current business and objectives. This was a large commitment from the Volunteer Board and was assisted by Kris Hanna providing Pro Bono legal assistance through the Justice Net organisation. We thank Kris Hanna for his guidance, advice and contributions to our review.

Market research

Playgroup SA also undertook a market research project to give us some clear evidence around the competition for parent time and space, what drives parents to make decisions about which activities to attend, and what members are looking for from Playgroup SA. We aim to understand what Playgroup SA can do to raise our profile and make Playgroup a priority for families. We were also seeking input and direction on what messages we need to be sharing in order for families to understand and appreciate the benefits of attending Playgroup. This information will also feed into the upcoming strategic planning cycle for 2018 and beyond. Our annual member survey was incorporated as part of this process.

Better Start

Playgroup SA continued to deliver services as part of the Better Start contract through Playgroup Australia. Playgroup Australia also confirmed the Better Start contract would continue for another 2 year period. This program enables Playgroup SA to provide events and support to promote inclusion for all abilities. We thank the Federal Government for their continued support.

PlayConnect

Playgroup SA was thrilled when it was confirmed the PlayConnect Program would also be extended for a further 2 years. The PlayConnect Program is a valuable Playgroup program aimed at providing support to families on the autism journey. In 2016/17 we continued to deliver the PlayConnect project at the following 3 locations:

Supported Playgroups

The Supported Playgroup Program funded through Uniting Care Wesley Port Adelaide, will also continue for a further period of 2 years. Playgroup SA has continued to grow both locations and provide valuable family support services at both locations. Community Playgroups

Our core focus of supporting Community Playgroups and Coordinators remains at the centre of all we do. We continued with our publications for both families and Coordinators attending Playgroup, and introduced our monthly blog on all things Playgroup and Play.

The Support and Development team went to great lengths to ensure the number of Playgroups supported through face to face visits increased, resources were reviewed and redesigned, workshop content was reviewed and new messy play services developed. The Support and Development team have also been busy behind the scenes working on new Playgroup material ready for the New Year in 2018.

Playgroup SA works with many organisation throughout the course of the year, however we have recently joined forces for a vital partnership with the Women's and Children's Health Network. The aim is to ensure the two organisations are working together to ensure families are supported during those first years, including referrals and information sharing. 
Snapshot 2016 to 2017


8 Playgroup SA Financials 2016 /2017

Our financial performance is strong in relation to liquidity position of PGSA. We did not meet our budgeted expectations regarding overall net profit. We anticipated a net deficit of \$8,878 for the year ended 30 June 2017, and actually achieved an overall net deficit of \$119,614.


The main reasons for expenses being higher than we budgeted were in relation to Playgoup SA requesting market research to provide input into strategic and operational decision making, HR consulting, additional long service leave provisions and there was a change in accounting policy for capitalisation and depreciation.


